Passing of Colin Kelsall



Nying-Jey Projects was saddened recently by the news of the sudden death of Colin Kelsall.

Colin joined the Nying-Jey Projects organisation in 2003 taking over the treasurer's role, alongside his wife Janeece, who became secretary. During a five year tenure with NJP Colin and Janeece reorganised and streamlined NJP systems management. Colin's contribution included the introduction of a new electronic accounting system for sponsorship payments and a database of sponsors and beneficiaries. Colin and Janeece also utilised their considerable experience in publishing to develop and distribute the NJP newsletter and develop the NJP website. These innovations were vital to the expansion of the sponsorship program during the period of their involvement.

Colin also contributed further to the expansion of NJP during his time with the Sacred Footsteps Mandala tours. Colin drove the bus, helped to set up the venues, helped look after the monks and maintain morale; he designed and manned the initial NJP sponsorship display boards. Many of our sponsors had their first introduction to NJP from Colin beside the monks and the mandala.

Colin and Janeece had the opportunity to travel to India and stay at the monastery where they were welcomed whole-heartedly by the monks. They never made the journey to Tibet, but their work for NJP is well known and appreciated there as well.

Our sincere condolences are extended to Janeece and to Colin's extended family and friends along with our sincere thanks for a wonderful contribution to the wellbeing of so many.



The Annual General Meeting of Nying Jey Projects for Tibetan Communities (Australia) Inc for 2014 was held on October 10. The meeting heard annual reports from Geshe Sonam Thargye, the President, and our treasurer, Peter Jost, and attended to the election of office bearers and committee for the coming year.

President's Report to the AGM

2013 -14 has been another very successful period for NJP. The successes include

- Increases in numbers of students being sponsored in Tibet. NJP now has a total of 426 students listed with 368 of these sponsored. There have been great efforts to monitor the eligibility of students, removing those no longer in need and including more who need financial assistance with their education.
- Maintenance of the sponsorships supporting nuns in Tibet - 151 nuns are sponsored.
- Maintenance and monitoring of monks and students in India. All beneficiaries in India are in the process of review; there are currently 190 monks and students sponsored.
- The addition of two more monks to the India committee and initiation of better monitoring procedures through ID cards for all beneficiaries in India.
- The 2013 Sacred Footsteps Tour and Tibet Tour raised significant funds to enable donations for scholarships. One hundred and one students were funded for university studies in the 2013-14 academic year.

Congratulations and sincere thanks to the NJP committee who have continued their excellent work during 2013-14. There have been great improvements to the accounting system and online management of the finances and data, and promotion of NJP through the mandala tour and other events. The committee members operate on a voluntary basis, while holding down full time jobs.

Because of the committee's work, and the generosity of our sponsors, life is becoming completely different for the students in Tibet. It is very common now for graduating students to find meaningful employment. This not only helps them individually but flows on to the wider community. Life is also much more comfortable for the nuns and monks we support.

Plans for the 2014-15 year include

- A new Sacred Footsteps Mandala Tour in 2015 which will continue to seek sponsorships for students, nuns and monks, and promote NJP programs.
- Monitoring the NJP programs to identify the areas of most need and promote sponsorships in those groups needing most help e.g. the monks from the Drepung monastery are very poor and in need of financial support.
- Fundraising to provide scholarships for at least 100 tertiary students next year.
- A visit to Ganzi during the coming year to personally assess the status of students in the Ganzi area. There is a need also to visit some areas outside of Ganzi e.g. Maningango, to see if any other communities need to be included in the NJP sponsorship program. In particular there is a need to assess educational needs of children from poor farming families, and also see if NJP can assist more nunneries.

And finally sincere thanks to all our sponsors, who continue to support this organisation, and as a result continue to make such a difference in the lives of so many Tibetan people.

The Top of the World Tours occurring every two years are a great way for sponsors to see for themselves the work that NJP does. They also provide the opportunity for NJP to catch up with students and nuns, collect photos and data for distribution to sponsors, to distribute payments directly from NJP, and to pass on our good wishes to students and their families.

Updating photos and data with the students is an enormous task especially considering the numbers involved and the cultural and language barriers. NJP does its very best to provide sponsors with the most accurate information possible. Being on the ground in Tibet is really the only way to collect the information. The 2014 tour in August was another great success. The small but enthusiastic group first made the long flight to the city of Chengdu and then took a 700km road trip to Ganzi (elevation 3500m), where they spent most of their three weeks. All returned safe and well with some great stories to tell. The trip was organised and accompanied by NJP committee member Cheryl Hopwood.

Students and their families met with the Tibet Tour group in Ganzi to receive their NJP sponsorship payments directly from Cheryl and the Ganzi committee.



314 of our 372 listed students attended. Cheryl was able to photograph and collect schooling data from most of them. It is a very busy occasion and requires a lot of organisation before the visit and on the day.

Drolma, one of our Ganzi students, sent back an open letter to all NJP sponsors

Seven Tibetan nunneries received visits from the tourists, this year including for the first time, a visit to our newest and most remote nunnery, Thang Kang – which involved a road trip of three hours.

The group delivered sponsorship money and the good wishes of our sponsors directly to the nuns. This is always a very happy occasion and the nuns make the visitors very welcome. Two members of the group were able to meet with their sponsored nun.

New photographs of most of the nuns were taken and many sponsors have already received a 2014 picture of their sponsored nun. Eighteen new nuns were added to the listings, but sadly the visits also brought news of the passing of some of the older nuns. The older nuns always touch the hearts of our TOWT visitors, and while their passing is sad, there is comfort knowing that through the generous sponsorship of people here in Australia, the lives of these elderly nuns is made more comfortable than might otherwise have been in their final years.



Spotlight on Thang Kang Nunnery by Cheryl Hopwood - NJP Sponsor Liaison

Off we set on a cool, dark morning to be the first from Nying-Jey Projects to visit the smallest and most remote of our nunneries, Thang Kang.



After a three and bit hour scenic and extremely bumpy ride over mountains and through beautiful valleys, we rounded the corner to come across a group of nuns digging out rocks on the side of the road. These were the nuns we had come to visit.

Thang Kang is home to just 21 nuns ranging in age from around 8 to about 50 years old. I have never met such a hard working lot in my life. Every nun was out on the side of the road digging out rocks to be used in building a fence.



Thankfully, they had a young man with a small

tractor to carry the rocks back to the nunnery.

After a delicious lunch, and an adventure I won't go into here, we got to meet the girls. Sadly, 3 of the Nuns in our program have passed away recently, but the others though shy were eager to meet us.

We presented them with their sponsorship money for which they are extremely thankful and grateful. These nuns, as with all of our nuns, share any money they receive with the whole nunnery. The sponsorship money is used for mainly their health and wellbeing. Any nuns who are unwell or in jail, are also taken care of. Prayers for the sponsors were then offered and melodic chanting was beautiful.



We then managed to take some photos of 'the girls'. The giggling and extreme shyness lead to quite a few extra shots being needed. Thang Kang is an extremely poor nunnery, but the warmth and kindness of the nuns was overwhelming.

University Scholarships, supporting students with the aptitude and desire to take their education to the tertiary level, have been an important adjunct to the NJP program since 2005, when four students, the first secondary school graduates, expressed interest in further education.

Nying-Jey Projects has been steadily growing its support for tertiary students since that time. The funding aims particularly to enable students to cover the costs of educational materials, transport, accommodation and living expenses for the university year. Fundraising for the tertiary scholarships comes partly from individual sponsors, but the main funding is generated from projects initiated by Geshe Sonam Thargye.

During the Tibet Tour Cheryl Hopwood, representing the Nying-Jey Projects committee, met with a large group of prospective university students for the 2014-15 scholastic year and their families. The Ganzi committee of NJP, which

includes a high school teacher, recommended monetary grants to 101 students to help finance their university studies for the coming year. Fifty-three students received funds to continue or complete their courses, while forty-eight students were supported to commence new courses. This is the third consecutive year that NJP has been able to provide support to over one hundred young people. Most pleasing is the variety of courses being studied from general language courses to law, engineering, medicine and more. A list of this year's students and their course information is included with this newsletter.

The Scholarship program is a wonderful success story for NJP. This year forty-eight students have graduated from tertiary courses. They will all soon be seeking employment in the Ganzi region with qualifications that give them an excellent chance of gaining a good job. The flow on effect of this to the wider community is immeasurable. We hope to bring news of their progress in the coming months.

Drol Kar Buddhist Centre is seeking donations for the expansion of its facilities at Paraparap Victoria. Plans are in motion to grow the centre by building a new two-storey wing. The new building will house resident and visiting teachers and also provide the Centre with a large kitchen and dining area to host larger group functions in comfort. It will enable the Centre to offer more opportunities for retreats throughout the year. The plans include a new office/library space in which **Nying-Jey Projects records** will also be housed.



Drol Kar sponsors and hosts the **Sacred Footsteps Mandala Tours**, which have been so important to the

promotion of NJP over many years, enabling NJP to reach out far and wide seeking more sponsors and support for our students, nuns and monks.

The new building is expected to be ready in time to provide brand new private accommodation and bathroom facilities for the **2015 tour monks**. As you see, there are lots of reasons for the NJP organisation to support this project.

SNOWLANDS Part 1 New Delhi - Guangzhou - Chengdu. 26/06/14 - 31/07/14

Dogs make absolutely the best and most honourable companions on earth. (Zen Chinese Zodiac)

Slept all the way. I paid \$6.50 for an un-drinkable coffee, then \$8.50 for a cup I was determined to drink. The airport is gob smacking. They have it sorted. My flights tick over like the proverbial Chinese watch. I feel the ratio of Indigenous to Aussie has broadened somewhat. I'm shrinking rapidly in an ocean of people. Thought India was bursting at the seams, hello Chengdu. Third biggest city.



I can see where the world's resources are going. Massive new infrastructure and building shadowing what's left of the old. It is clean and planned and almost pretty through the thick smog, and all made in China. There's electric powered scooters everywhere. Silent and hazardous for pedestrians. The Shufeng Hotel on Wuhouci Main Street. Cracked and old but makes up for it with the nice touches, like a card on the bed wishing me a pleasant sleep. On the back it instructs **DO NOT SMOKE IN BED**. See! The little things.



Target food, famished. Eat at a family 'do' open street restaurant. Fish sauce noodles, beans, chilli roast spuds and a two hander BIG mug of beer, from the tap. Total 19 yuan. (\$3.20). Then a creamy chocolate sundae. Need to fatten up for the journey ahead.

Meet the new tour group. Smaller as some have pulled out and a good vibe. They need sleep so I explore.

Get a haircut and shave, carried out with absolute precision. The shampoo basin area doubles as kitchen and dining room. I walk to a park filled with Gingkgo trees. Gingkgo Park of course.



I buy nuts and apples and walk along The Fu River to a shaded landing.



A local man offers me water and we shell and eat nuts. Shooting the breeze on The Fu. It's 33° but haven't noticed. There are the forgotten here too. I hand over my water to a beggar and then later, see him with a wad of cash. Anyhoo!

On board with the group we have Namgyal (Geshe Sonam's brother), and Namgyal's daughter Shoyang, who has returned from English study in Beijing. Quickly down to 2 lanes and climbing slowly. Mountains, huge dammed rivers through thick forest. A pity the smog is heavier. Beautifully haunting Chinese ballads playing on the radio adds to the authentic experience. The road disappears into potholes and landslides as we catch up to the traffic. Three or four hours now - says Tashi our driver. He's doing his best overtaking on every corner and dodging others doing the same. It's a long day and lots of fun with winding roads, tunnels and small villages and near misses.

Kangding Ballard County is nestled in a valley split by a fierce water channel and sheer walls of granite. Spectacular! Here too the development is booming. The locals are welcoming and very interested in these strange looking travellers. The many controlled water channels feed the hydro electric systems. (2600M).

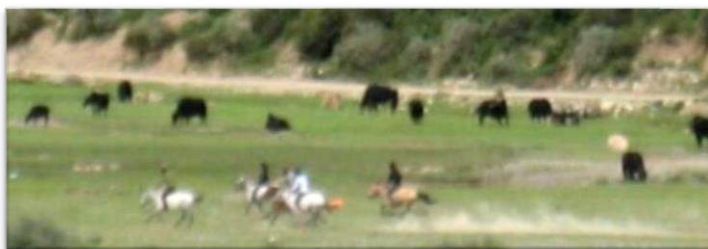
The hotel has an hourly rate and includes accessories of a dubious nature. No mini bar but 2 minute noodles. Yay!



I eat breakfast with Namgyal and another. It's communal eating at every table in the street. Rice porridge, dumplings and boiled egg of unknown origin. I try to pay but it's Namgyal's shout. It's hustle bustle at the table with many now eating. We begin our climb and climb to the clouds. The terrain changes to limestone hills. Roaming yaks graze between the occasional Tibetan prayer flags.



Stop at the first Khanzhe-Duo pass and try yak kebabs on the roadside. Excellent! (4670M). The hills green with scattered nomads tents and herds. The Tibetan horsemen, horses saddled and strapped, are seen moving their herds of yak across the valley's. Stop at Lu Huo and enjoy boiled Yak, noodles and chillies for lunch (3250M).



Impeccable timing we discover a traditional horse race on the plateau of the Gong Ka La Mountains about to begin. Unable to get a bet on, so we follow in the bus.

Might pass on the next Yak dish though.
Nice part of the world here and quiet.

Ganzi/Garze is a small city. (3400M). I'm a little dizzy and bloody nosed as expected. Namgyal is putting the group up with assorted members of family. Comfortable in the heart of Ganzi. I take off for the hills and fields of barley with a sprinkling of farmers' traditional tents. I don't stay long at the stupa as I'm being eyed by a bull. He shapes up seriously, snorting and stamping hooves. The rope between his freedom and my safety offers little comfort.

The locals are engaging but don't get far passed "hello". In search of dinner we are refused service several times before success. This chef invites me to the kitchen to inspect the contents of the fridge. Settle for fresh peas, onion, rice and warm Snow Beer. My room is lit by the disco style advertising from across the street. I sleep anyway.



Rice porridge, apricots, bananas and roof yoga before walking to Namgyal Temple. I'm followed by kids with infectious laughter. Finding the river takes me via downtown and there is heaps of development in progress. I sit at the only turd free area and watch ducks feeding and fish jumping. Lovely!

The Chinese Degondbu Hans Gonpa is only 1000 years old so a nice place to sit and meditate. The prayer wheels squeak as many circumambulate reciting their mantras. Remember I must purchase a yak beanie.
